FUTURE-FOCUSED

Bay of Plenty Trades Academy was formed in 2009 as one of the country's first trades academies. Since this time, it has been changing and growing to meet the workforce and regional growth needs of the Bay of Plenty with over 862 students involved in 2021. To align with our vision to be a 21st Century trades programme, Bay of Plenty Trades Academy became known as Bay of Plenty Futures Academy in 2020 (BoPFA).

THE FUTURES ACADEMY OPTION

Senior students at schools throughout the Bay of Plenty have the opportunity to enrol in the Futures Academy to combine their school learning experience with tertiary trades training at one of our 8 tertiary partners.

At BoPFA, students engage in vocational/trades based programmes that pathway to skills-based qualifications on the National Qualifications Framework, pre-trade entry experience, local apprenticeships, or further tertiary trades training.

All of our programmes support students' achievement at National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 1, 2 or 3, provide tertiary credits and many lead toward national certificates.

WHAT BEHAVIOUR IS EXPECTED OF ME AT FUTURES ACADEMY?

Students are expected to maintain 100% attendance, so they can get the most out of their experience.

The Futures Academy provides an adult learning environment where you are encouraged to be selfdirected, self-motivated and assume responsibility for your learning. To do this you will need to be committed to attending your course and being fully involved in the learning process.

Normal school rules apply with respect to alcohol, smoking, drug use - these are forbidden.

Students are to remain on the Futures Academy campus at all times and must notify their tutor if they need to leave early.

Any serious attendance or behaviour breach will be communicated to and addressed by the school at which the student is enrolled — and could result in your withdrawal from Futures Academy.

HOW DO I APPLY? HOW DO I GET SELECTED?

To be considered, you will need to have:

- expressed a genuine interest in trades or workforce training
- a record of regular school attendance
- displayed consistent and responsible behaviour at school
- shown a level of maturity to be able to study at two campuses and manage the associated workload.


DOES THE FUTURES ACADEMY GIVE ME CREDITS TOWARDS NCEA?

OUR FUTURES ACADEMY COURSES OFFER INNOVATIVE, HANDS-ON TERTIARY TRADES LEARNING THROUGH OFFERING...

TASTER COURSES

- Where students can gain "a taste" of several different industries by enrolling in 3 separate courses, 1
 each term, to make up a full year programme.
- Generally, courses offered are for Levels 1 or 2, one day a week, for 10 week terms.

FOUNDATION COURSES

- Offer a foundational skills and training experience for students re: a particular trade.
- Generally, a level 2 course, offered one day a week, for 30 weeks.

ADVANCED COURSES

- Offer a more in-depth skills training, where student can also attain credits towards an industry
 certificate or pathway directly into apprenticeships, trades employment or further tertiary level training.
- Generally, courses are offered at a level 2 or 3, and are held 1 or 2 days a week, for 30 weeks.

COHORT COURSES**

- · Designed for groups of students from one school.
- Generally, courses are offered at a level 2:
 - held one day a week, over 30 weeks
 - or noho style through intensive 1-week blocks, over a 30-week period

The Level 2 horticulture programme is delivered over 2 years and is designed to give you an introduction to the horticulture sector and a taste of the range of opportunities and roles that exist within it. The programme will provide you with practical experiences and the opportunity to learn about horticulture in a real work environment all whilst gaining NCEA Level 2 credits and working towards the New Zealand Certificate in Primary Industry Skills (level 2).

TE AO TAAWHIRANGI ONEHI

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TE ARA MAHI O TE RŪNANGA O NGĀTI AWA / Technical Training Pilot

Ngāti Awa Technical Training Centre is focused on developing a programme of activities in response to sector gaps within the Eastern Bay of Plenty. Our initial focus is on a Marine Training Programme, and it is our expectation that we will provide a workforce to meet the growth aspirations of the local boat building sector and marine economy.

Extreme Boats is one of the largest aluminium boat builders in New Zealand. Their growth is largely hampered not by sales, but by a lack of qualified staff. There is a lack of aligned training within the district to meet their needs. We are responding to that need.

This initiative is an Iwi partnership, which sets out to attract rangatahi Maori who whakapapa to Ngāti Awa, and/or live within the rohe. We want to expose them to various workforce pathways so that they become aware of employment options that are available to them. We want to ensure that our rangatahi needs are supported, so it is necessary that we include tikanga and cultural support as well as a mentor to support your journey.

The two courses we are providing offers the opportunity to learn and work within the boat building environment at Extreme Boats.

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

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

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
